The Royal British Legion & The Poppy Appeal 2018 How it started...

100 years ago the First World War ended. The Royal British Legion was formed as a charity to support those who fought and suffered in the war. A lot of people sadly lost their lives to help save and form the place we live today.

Each year we mark the 11th November at 11am with a silence to remember those who fought and those that lost their lives. In the run up to this date we sell poppies as a mark of respect for what those people did for our country.

What do the Royal British Legion do?

Over the years, all the money raised has helped the charity look after people and their families of the armed forces who are in need, financially or otherwise. They spend nearly £2 million per week on welfare activities!

I am a volunteer for the Royal British Legion poppy appeal. In my spare time (at weekends and in the school holidays), I help prepare and make all of the poppy boxes up for shops, schools and other places you would go to.

For our school I have made an extra special selection of things!

At Waycroft last year we raised £243.57, so it would be amazing if we could raise more money this year. The money raised can be used to do so much good for people in need!
