### Accelerated Reader

We have been made aware of some confusion with Accelerated Reader as well as having received some useful feedback. The scores (ZPD) that your child receives give a range of challenge for your child to be working at. Children should be reading a school book within these scores about 80% of the time, so there is opportunity for children to read other books that are of interest to them or that are recommended or even just for pleasure. As you can imagine the books we are getting the children to choose to read in school are within the levels, but if you have a book from home that the child reads independently, they can still quiz on it and the results of these quizzes can be looked at.

The breadth of the reading score is to:

- Build the children's ability to choose appropriate books for their comprehension level so they can capitalise on their reading experiences (a number of our children do like the easy option!)
- Give a range so that the books are sometimes challenging or sometimes comfortable to develop their enjoyment of reading as we would do as adults

Your child's range is personal to them – the range gets wider as children become stronger readers.

- The lowest number in the scores represent books that are fairly comfortable for your child to access and fully understand and be able to ask questions about the content, vocabulary and the impact on the reader. If your child finds reading difficult or they really don't enjoy it, this is likely to be the best place for them to be choosing from to start to build confidence and develop their skills in a structured way with small steps.
- The midpoint would provide some challenge for your child on one or all of these areas. This is where children can be developing their reading skills through challenging themselves.
- The higher numbers within the range would be more challenging for your child and they are highly likely to need adult input to: check they understand all of the vocabulary, they may need to re-read sentences to ensure they understand meaning and/or there may be some themes they need to get clarity on such as if the book was set in a historical period which is very different to their own experiences.

We have some further staff training coming up regarding ZPD scores, so when children receive updated ranges later in the year, we will ensure the ZPD score is at least in line with where they were previously, as some children have been worried about regressing. Teachers will communicate with you via your child's reading diary with any specific individual recommendation such as to suggest your child reads two books from the top of their range as a challenge or suggest they read from a narrow range for a few weeks to develop confidence but this will be on an individual basis and can be discussed with your child's class teacher if you would like clarification for the reasons.

We apologise for any inconsistencies that you have experienced at the start of the year, this is the first year to year roll over we have done since the programme implementation. Please can I take this opportunity to reiterate that we are happy to hear from you, as parents and carers, as we can't adapt things if we don't know – these minor clarifications/adjustments have been really easy to act on very quickly. We are here to help and we all want what is best for your children.

## The uniform for boys and girls is as follows:

- School cardigan, sweatshirt or fleece in royal blue (embroidered with the school badge and house name).
- White shirt with a collar or white polo shirt.
- Smart shorts, skirt, trousers or pinafore dress in grey or black. (No jeans or leggings).
- Blue and white gingham dresses can be worn when the weather is warm enough.
- White, grey or black ankle or knee high socks.
- Black or blue tights.
- Plain Black flat shoes with laces or buckles or flat black ankle or calf length boots.
- Long hair to be tied back.
- One wrist watch.
- Children with pierced ears may wear up to one pair of small studs preferably not to be worn on PE days.
- Outdoor coats
- Wellington Boots

### PE Kit (Not required for Nursery children)

- Plain white short sleeved T shirt or house T-shirt (yellow, red, blue or green).
- Black sports shorts.
- Black or navy blue jogging trousers and a black or navy blue plain sweatshirt from Y1 upwards
- Sports trainers or black slip on daps. Children will not be allowed to wear their school shoes for PE.
- Drawstring PE bag

At school adults will encourage pupils to be in full uniform and represent their school with pride.

Please ensure all items are labelled with your child's name and check regularly that this has not washed off.

## Aldi sticker collection




We have 16 stickers to go to reach the completed target!
